3	MS. THERESA KNICKERBOCKER: Welcome to
4	the village of Buchanan September 2, 2025 board
5	meeting. Please join me in the pledge of
6	allegiance.
7	MULTIPLE: I pledge allegiance to the
8	flag of the United States of America and to the
9	Republic for which it stands, one nation under
10	God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for
11	all.
12	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: In case of
13	emergency, please use the exit door to my left,
14	to your right, and do not use the elevator.
15	Please use the staircase behind the elevator.
16	Next is approval of minutes, the July 22nd
17	special meeting and workshop meeting, and the
18	August 5, 2025 board meeting. Any corrections or
19	comments?
20	MR. STEVEN LAKER: No, I'm good.
21	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Everybody good?
22	MR. DANIEL STEWART: I'm good, Mayor.
23	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: All right. So, I'd
24	like to make a motion to approve those minutes.

3	MR. LAKER: Second.
4	MR. STEWART: Second.
5	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: All in favor?
6	MULTIPLE: Aye.
7	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Thank you. Comments
8	from the floor, agenda items only. No comments,
9	okay. So, under new business, we're going to, I'm
10	going to make a motion to open the public hearing
11	for the NY2A New York State DEC requirements for
12	the permit upgrade at the wastewater plant. Can I
13	have a second?
14	MS. AWILDA BAEZ: Second.
15	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: All in favor?
16	MULTIPLE: Aye.
17	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: And we have our
18	engineer here this evening, George Pommer will,
19	who will explain what this means.
20	MR. GEORGE POMMER: Sure. Good evening,
21	mayor, board of trustees. Part of the NY2A permit
22	is, part of the upgrade is to have a public
23	participation plan. That's a DEC requirement.
24	It's explained, all this is on the website, by

the way, and there's notices and updates on the website. And part of this is to, as part of the upgrade from .75 from -- I'm sorry from .5 to .75 MGD, it's for compliance with DEC environmental commissioner policy 29, environmental justice and permitting policy CP29. It provides stakeholders the opportunity to be informed and involved in the review process.

It involves the upgrade from, as I mentioned, .5 to .75 MGD. The project is on Greentown Road at the sewer treatment plant.

There are no residential properties surrounding the sewage treatment plant. There will be construction activities and everything associated with it, noise, vehicles going in and out as part of the project, going in and out of Greentown Road. There will be no adverse environmental impacts. Everything will be consolidated to the footprint of the existing sewage treatment plant or, or possibly slightly larger.

This is the public outreach process.

It's encouraged to have a dialogue and solicit input from interested stakeholders, opportunities

for the stakeholders to ask questions is part of the process. What we're required to mention to you tonight is a brief overview of the project.

We're basically taking our existing sewage treatment plant, decommissioning it and building a new one.

Updates, we mentioned the location.

There's a repository of documents at the village website. Contact information, Marcus Serrano or the village clerk can be contacted with any questions or comments regarding the public outreach. Future outreaches can be through, again the public, through the village administrator or the, or the clerk. And this, this meeting is a public hearing which will be opened and closed as part of the process.

Distribution, okay, after, after the process is complete and the DEC reviews the permit, and this is, this is one step in the permit process, they will provide what is known as a notice of complete application. Part of that notice that will be put on the village website and part of that notification comes an approval

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saying that you went from .5 to .75 MPD and that's -- and then we have to certify that we followed all the procedures mentioned in this public participation program. And that's basically, excuse me, everything that's in the in the in the in the plan. And the stakeholders are mentioned. We have listed the Village of Buchanan, Town of Cortlandt, City of Peekskill and Village of Croton on Hudson. They were specifically reached out to. Information, the notice is in Spanish as well. And that's, that's pretty much it.

And as I mentioned, part of this is to provide a resolution, which is, would be the next item on the agenda. And again, it reiterates all the same things that we just talked about, that it's compliance with the New York State DEC permitting process and that you held a meeting, a duly held meeting, it was properly noticed and we followed all the procedures mentioned in that CP29 process.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay.

MR. POMMER: That's it.

MR. POMMER:

3	yeah, this is the process that we're going
4	through to upgrade the plant. So, right now, our
5	permit allows us 500,000 gallons per day.
6	MR. POMMER: Correct.
7	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: And this would
8	allow, if we get approved, because we're putting
9	the application in up to 750,000 gallons a day.
10	MR. POMMER: Correct.
11	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay. Because I know
12	you were you were saying, you know, it's just to
13	break it down to, you know, the public like what
14	is a what is a 500 MGD type thing. So, I just
15	MR. POMMER: Correct.
16	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: wanted to just,
17	just clarify that a little bit.
18	MR. POMMER: Yep.
19	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay. Does the board
20	have any questions or comments? No?
21	MR. LAKER: No. Just glad to get to this
22	point.
23	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Mm-hmm.
24	MR. POMMER: Yeah. There was a lot of

2	steps in the way.
3	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah.
4	MR. POMMER: We went through the, the,
5	the financial portion of it earlier in the year.
6	We went through this part. This actually started
7	in September. We sent a letter to the DEC. We had
8	a lot of input. We described to them what we were
9	doing, who was involved, and part of this big
10	driver of this is the closing of Entergy, right.
11	So that's, that's a big driver. And, and the
12	changing of the M2 zone and having that potential
13	or having that extra capacity for that
14	development of there's potentially 178, 170
15	acres out of 241 that could be developed sooner
16	than, than the rest of it. So, that was that was
17	one of the, one of the letters that we sent to
18	the DEC to substantiate the increase in flow. And
19	that was their September 18th letter, 2024.
20	MS. BAEZ: Just got to check all the
21	boxes, right, George?
22	MR. POMMER: Check all the boxes.
23	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Any comments from
24	the floor? Yes, sir. Please come up to the

3	MR. JONATHAN YANOVSKY: John Yanovsky,
4	Donahue Court. What brought me here? I'm
5	wondering, it talks about release of water into
6	the Hudson River and I want to understand what
7	that is and why that's happening.
8	MR. POMMER: So, back in, back when the
9	plant was first built and put into operation,
10	part of the process is to have a discharge. The
11	waste is actually treated to almost a drinking
12	water quality standard and discharged into the
13	Hudson. It's chlorinated and sent into the
14	Hudson. So all the solids, all the particulate,
15	meet the, the permit from the DEC. It's 95
16	percent, taking out 95 percent of the particulate
17	matter and it has a BOD, which is also the, the
18	organisms are taken out of the sludge.
19	MR. YANOVSKY: And they consider that to
20	be kosher?
21	MR. POMMER: Yes.
22	MR. YANOVSKY: Okay.
23	MR. LAKER: I believe it's being used in
24	several other municipalities

3	MR. LAKER: along the Hudson River.
4	MR. POMMER: Correct.
5	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: The Hudson River,
6	Long Island Sound
7	MR. LAKER: Sleepy Hollow.
8	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: That's how the sewer
9	treatment plants work.
10	MR. YANOVSKY: All right.
11	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah.
12	MR. YANOVSKY: So, why are we increasing
13	the amount of water that we're doing that to?
14	MR. POMMER: So, Indian Point shut down.
15	MR. YANOVSKY: Yes.
16	MR. POMMER: And they, they, they at the
17	time only had about 10 or 20,000 gallons of, of
18	waste that they brought our way, sometimes more.
19	When they had outages, they had more. But when it
20	gets redeveloped, there's the potential or any
21	property in the not only that one but other
22	properties in the village get redeveloped, that
23	capacity is there. And it's also there as part of
24	the IMA agreement with the town of Cortlandt,

2	where the, where the village working with the
3	town gave the town 100,000 gallons of sludge, us,
4	a waste treatment process.
5	MR. YANOVSKY: So what makes up the
6	other 650,000 then?
7	MR. POMMER: So about 250 or 300 is
8	about the average. Like right now in the
9	summertime it's about 250 300, but in the winter
10	or when there's heavy rain events or heavy
11	infiltration we can get up to 300, 350. And then
12	the capacity to give to the town is 100. And then
13	whatever gets built in the village, as far as
14	Entergy or any other property, actually we have -
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16	MR. YANOVSKY: AMS?
17	MR. POMMER: AMS and, and Village
18	Square.
19	MR. YANOVSKY: This is for those new
20	developments like across 9A or
21	MR. POMMER: Yes. It, it does help them,
22	yes.
23	MR. YANOVSKY: Okay.
24	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: All right.

2	MR. YANOVSKY: Got it.
3	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: And then with the
4	increased capacity, the 250,000 the town also
5	gets, with the intermunicipal agreement, they get
6	25 percent of that, which is approximately I
7	think 62,000 gallons more.
8	MR. LAKER: Which we had to enter into
9	the agreement with the town in order to get the
10	release of the Holtec funds, correct?
11	MR. POMMER: Correct.
12	MR. YANOVSKY: How much burden does
13	Buchanan have to shoulder all of it or
14	financially?
15	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: No. No. In the
16	agreement, there's specifics on what they need
17	MR. YANOVSKY: Separate parts?
18	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: to
19	MR. POMMER: Correct.
20	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: yeah, pay. All
21	right. Thank you, some good questions, thank you.
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	Any, anyone else? Any other comments? Okay. I'd
23	like to make a motion to close the public
24	hearing. Can I have a second, please?

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MS. BAEZ: Second.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay. All in favor?

4 MULTIPLE: Aye.

All right. Thank MS. KNICKERBOCKER: you. All right, I'm going to read a resolution now. Whereas pursuant to the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation Commissioner Policy 29, Environmental Justice and Permitting, CP29, the Village of Buchanan is required to provide the public the opportunity to participate, comment, and ask questions about the New York 2A permit application to the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for the increase in the allowable discharge from the Village of Buchanan Wastewater Plant from .50 MGD to .75 MGD. Whereas on September 2, 2025, at a duly noticed meeting of the Village Board of Trustees, the application was presented to the public and a public hearing was open and whereas no -- and whereas comments were received from the public which will be taken into consideration during the application process. Now be -- now be it therefore resolved that the Village of

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Buchanan Board of Trustees hereby closes the public hearing for the NY2A permit application.

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All right. Can I have a second?

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MR. STEWART: Second.

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MS. KNICKERBOCKER: All in favor?

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MULTIPLE: Aye.

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MS. KNICKERBOCKER: All right. Thank

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you. Okay. We have a continued discussion on the

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Complete Streets Program. Unfortunately, we did

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not have it noticed in time to have the public hearing this evening. So, we will be having a

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public hearing on Tuesday, next Tuesday, October

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(SIC) 9th at 700 p.m. here. And we've discussed

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this a couple of times here on the board. The

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Complete Streets Program is the county makes

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available \$15 million for the 45 municipalities in Westchester County to apply for a grant. We

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have decided that we were going to put a grant in

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for three areas of the village and one is the

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Albany Post Road sidewalk across from Da-Ro's,

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Westchester Avenue, there's only one section that

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still needs to be finished, it's by the school

and then Westchester Avenue will be totally --

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have total sidewalks on it. And also, we've talked about this quite a few times, the Bannon Avenue, Tate Avenue, intersections. Yeah, we, we've gone around and around with that, so we'd like to apply for those grants and see what money we can get, so that we can get those, those sidewalks done for the village. Any comments from the -- Marcus?

MR. MARCUS SERRANO: Mayor, I'll just give you and the board an update on I, as the mayor recommended, I called the school district to get a letter of support. He gave us a contingent letter of support based on his review of the grant application. So he sent me a letter says he's agreeable to those locations for the safety for the children, but he wants to see the grant application before he gives a formal letter.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay.

MR. SERRANO: So I informed the grant writer when he finishes the grant application, before he submits it to pass it to the superintendent for his review. I'm also still

2	waiting for a email or agreement from the town,
3	that they're still an agreement in joining us on
4	that. I sent two emails to the, to the engineer
5	to ask him where's the update on that. So I'm
6	waiting, but he say he was going to go to the
7	town board to make sure the interest is still
8	there. We still got some time, but I want to give
9	you an update on that as well. So hopefully,
10	we'll get a letter of support from the town as
11	well as the school district.
12	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay. And that grant
13	needs to be submitted September 17th?
14	MR. SERRANO: 19th.
15	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: 19th. Okay. So, we
16	got a little time, but
17	MR. SERRANO: Yes.
18	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: starting to cut
19	it close. Okay. Any other board members like to
20	comment on this? No.
21	MR. LAKER: No.
22	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay. Okay. The next
23	is a resolution to adopt an intermunicipal
24	agreement with Westchester County for mutual aid

1 September 2, 2025 2 and rapid response for the police department with Westchester County. And this will go for a 5 year 3 plan, it's July 31, 2025 to July 30 of 2030. This 4 5 is a standard agreement. The services from Westchester County are free, but in case of a 6 7 catastrophic, I quess, situation where we would have to call in other municipalities, other 8 9 police departments, they will come in and we 10 would have to reimburse the municipality. But 11 this is something good to have, because you never 12 know in today's world with everything going on. 13 So you know we work well with Peekskill, we work 14 well with other different departments. Everybody 15 works well together. So this is a good thing to 16 have. Any comments from the board? 17 MS. BAEZ: I'm in agreement. 18 MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah, it's standard. 19 It's standard. MR. STEWART: 20

MR. CAPICOTTI: Yeah, I'm good, thanks.

MR. STEWART: And we discussed it the workshops, thank you.

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MS. KNICKERBOCKER: So I will read the resolution. Whereas Westchester County and the

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police departments of Westchester County have developed a mutual aid and rapid response plan for the police departments of Westchester County, New York, to formalize operational procedures for obtaining and receiving law enforcement assistance in Westchester County and whereas it is necessary for the village to enter into an intermunicipal agreement with the County of Westchester agreeing to participate in the plan by which each participating agency agrees to make available its police personnel and equipment to other participating agencies upon the occurrence of an event or condition which is beyond the scope of its own police resources. Now, be it therefore resolved that the mayor being hereby authorized to execute said intermunicipal agreement and all other necessary documents between the Village of Buchanan and the County of Westchester for the purpose of participating in said plan and establishing the terms and conditions of same, including the reimbursements to be paid there under. And be it further resolved, the Chief of Police be and hereby is

7	MR. STEWART: Second.
8	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: All in favor?
9	MULTIPLE: Aye.
10	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay.
11	MR. SERRANO: Mayor, I don't want to
12	interrupt.
13	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yes, I'm sorry?
14	MR. SERRANO: In case you want to let
15	George go
16	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: No, I have a few
17	questions.
18	MR. SERRANO: Okay.
19	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Can I can,
20	George, so what I'm going to do, I'm, I'm going
21	to go away from the agenda since we still have
22	the engineer here. So the big question is Church
23	Street. When, what's the estimated time for that
24	to be completed?

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MR. POMMER: So they, as you can see they start -- oh, they started the curb work on the, I'm going to say the right, so it's the west side of the road going up.

MR. SERRANO: Yeah.

MR. POMMER: They got, they have the catch basins were delivered, catch basins and drain manhole structures were delivered to their yard today, or was it is it -- today is Tuesday? Yeah, they were delivered today. They're going to stage them there and bring them up. The pipe is going to be staged at the highway garage. And we've been in discussions with the school and they're, if things don't work out they're going to enter and exit through the backside by Henry Street. So that way they can get in and out and the work doesn't impact them. But in the morning for that one hour or whatever, they're going to be away from that area. It's going to be -- if you go down there now, you'll see it's plated. People can get in and out of their driveways and so forth. So, that's the same condition that's going to be on the other side of the street.

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They're going to be able to get in and out. It's going to be made safe every night. They're going to start from the bottom up. And at this point, they're going to -- the school's going to have to go in through the back or the side for the duration of the project. And, and that's going to be left in a condition where people can get in and out. But the, the main reason it got delayed was the catch basin delivery, the structures. Hard to, hard to do anything without structures, so, but that's where we're at.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay. Good.

MR. POMMER: So.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: And then the only other question, we've -- you were here at one meeting. We've had discussions about potentially doing a ball field at Lents Cove and then there was a discussion about doing borings to see where the ground was uneven. Holtec has agreed to pay for the borings.

MR. POMMER: Oh.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: So I told them they would need to contact you, so you will decide

2	what the borings, how many and where they are.
3	And I think a really good asset for this would be
4	Bob Wheeler.
5	MR. POMMER: He would. He, he probably
6	knows that field like the back of his hand.
7	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah.
8	MR. POMMER: To go out there and lay out
9	the best spots and then put them on a map and
10	give them to somebody to, to check out. You know,
11	other than you typically you do a grid pattern,
12	you know, every so many feet throughout the field
13	and then that's, that's typical. But Bob might
14	say, oh over here in this location it sinks a
15	little more, I've put stuff here. So that's, you
16	know, that, that extra insight to somebody doing
17	that kind of work is helpful.
18	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay. All right, I -
19	- does anybody else have anything oh, do you
20	have
21	MR. CAPICOTTI: I do.
22	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: something for
23	George, Anthony?
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MR. CAPICOTTI: Yeah. Why is Holtec not

2	utilizing their own engineer for this to lay out
3	the grid for the, for the boring? Why are we
4	using ours?
5	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: They are have
6	they do have an engineer involved, but we want to
7	make sure we don't want to just rely on their
8	engineer, because half of it is our property. So,
9	we want to make sure that we're protected.
10	MR. CAPICOTTI: But why are they not
11	using theirs?
12	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: No, they are. They
13	are going to use their engineer, so
14	MR. CAPICOTTI: On their property?
15	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah, mm-hmm. So
16	their engineer will be involved and, you know, I
17	just think, you know, they could tell us, yeah
18	this is where we think the boring should be. But
19	we want to protect the village too, on our
20	property to make sure that we're, we're covered
21	too.
22	MR. CAPICOTTI: Well they're going to
23	lay out a grid and just like George said.
24	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Mm-hmm.

2	MR. CAPICOTTI: And they're going to
3	bore according to that grid, and that's going to
4	be their, the stabilization zone where they think
5	it's stable and where it's not.
6	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Mm-hmm.
7	MR. CAPICOTTI: I mean it's not really -
8	- it's up to an engineer to determine that.
9	MR. POMMER: Yeah. They could, they
10	could submit it to us for review.
11	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: For review.
12	MR. POMMER: I mean, if we wanted to
13	look at it before they did it and say, oh, yeah,
14	you missed this corner of left field or that
15	corner or whatever. But yeah, they probably it
16	should maybe be initiated by them is is what -
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18	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay.
19	MR. CAPICOTTI: Absolutely.
20	MR. POMMER: Them initiating it and us
21	reviewing it, that that saves us a lot of time
22	and effort for sure.
23	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah. I just, I just
24	wanted our engineer to be involved in it. I just

2	didn't want them to be the only
3	MR. SERRANO: You, you think they'll be
4	willing to put escrow up, so that way taxpayers
5	not paying for George's time?
6	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: I could ask. How
7	much time do you think George to review?
8	MR. POMMER: It shouldn't only take a
9	couple hours to well, it's not just to look at
10	it. I mean, it's going to be a grid, but to go
11	out there with Bob and, or have Bob look at it
12	and say, yeah, let's, let's do a little bit more
13	over here or maybe that's off what, what might be
14	off the field and say, okay, let's go beyond the
15	edge of the field a little bit in this area or
16	that area.
17	MR. STEWART: But only part of that is
18	owned by Holtech and part of is by the village,
19	correct?
20	MR. POMMER: You know, I'm not sure
21	where the line is down there.
22	MR. SERRANO: It's around home plate and
23	second base.
24	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah, second base.

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2	MR. LAKER: Is it?
3	MR. STEWART: I think we should probably
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5	MR. POMMER: Is it that
6	MR. SERRANO: We don't have, yeah.
7	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: They are in the
8	process of, of surveying it, the property, so.
9	MR. POMMER: That's the first step. So
10	you got to get the survey, lay out the grid, and
11	then we take a look at it and then Bob can take,
12	even Bob could look at it and say, okay, go in
13	this area more. It doesn't really have to, it
14	doesn't have to be anything extensive, so.
15	MR. LAKER: But we just have to be
16	concerned with anything that's done on village
17	property as far as insurance is concerned and
18	MR. POMMER: Yeah.
19	MR. LAKER: and who's doing the
20	MR. STEWART: Liability.
21	MR. LAKER: approval that's done.
22	MR. POMMER: Yeah.
23	MR. CAPICOTTI: Well, Holtec's assuming
24	the responsibility to bore on our property.

3	MR. CAPICOTTI: And they're going to
4	pick up the expense for that as well?
5	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yes.
6	MR. LAKER: And they should be held
7	harmless, so
8	MR. POMMER: Yeah. But yeah, their
9	contractor has to submit the proper insurances.
10	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: So, we'll have to
11	yeah, we'll have to see what those results are
12	with the borings.
13	MR. GRIFFENBERG: Sure.
14	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Then we can make a
15	decision from there. At least we can make an
16	educated decision at that point.
17	MR. SERRANO: Mayor, can you ask Holtec
18	for a certificate of insurance then, so we have
19	our insurance broker check that over too?
20	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Insurance to do the
21	borings?
22	MR. SERRANO: Yeah.
23	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay.
24	MR. SERRANO: To get on our property. I

2	don't want if one of the employees get hurt on
3	that property, they've got a worker's comp case.
4	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay.

We happen to be one of 22 -- well, we're in 22 counties. The corridor goes, I have a map here, the corridor goes from really almost Long Island to Niagara Falls area. So, we'll be part of the scenic byway at no cost to the village. Are there any questions from the board on this? We had gotten the information. It's pretty straightforward also. So, I'll read the resolution.

Whereas the historic qualities of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic byway, as described in the quarter management plan, and the surrounding areas have been appreciated and to celebrate it for over a century by the residents of New York State, as

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well as tourists, historians, artists, authors, and other visitors to the region. And it is this unique combination of the journeys of Harriet Tubman and those freedom seekers who traveled on the Underground Railroad that create the special sense of place that is vital in telling the New York story of the human desire for freedom and the historic sites they created during their journey to emancipation.

And whereas the steering committee of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway, composed of representatives 22 municipalities along the proposed scenic byway route committed to work cooperatively to protect and promote the historic, scenic, recreational and economic wellbeing of the 544-mile corridor throughout the state and agreed to pursue the nomination of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway.

And whereas under the leadership of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York

Scenic Byway Steering Committee, each of the 22 counties contributed to the development of this

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corridor management plan by forming local byway groups, encouraging public participation, and leading individual meetings of the collaborative.

And whereas the advisory committee of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway, consisting of relatives of Harriet Tubman, descendants of freedom seekers, Harriet Tubman and or Underground Railroad historians, representatives from, from the state and federal agencies has strength strengthened the historic integrity, representation and principles of the corridor management plan.

And whereas in the process of developing this -- developing this corridor management plan, the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway Steering Committee has strengthened the bonds of intermunicipal cooperation and the involved entities envision further benefit through scenic byway designation including sustained collaborative progress, increased funding opportunities for recommend-recommendations identified in the plan, enhanced partnerships with agencies responsible for the

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stewardship of resources along and adjacent to the byway route and an improved transportation experience that preserves, interprets, and promotes the corridor's intrinsic qualities and resources.

And there's more. Now therefore, it be resolved that the Village of Buchanan supports the designation of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway which includes programs for stewardship and enhancement of the scenic byway and guidance to manage future activities along its corridors. And be it further resolved that the Village of Buchanan confirms that this -- they will -- that they will not approve any requests for new off-premises outdoor advertising signs, this is big, along the designated Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway route.

And be it further resolved that the village of Buchanan will work in partnership with the other municipalities along the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway and local and regional stakeholders in order to

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support future byway program development and collaborate with these interested entities to explore opportunities for cooperation and method, and methods to advance the scenic byway.

One thing I do want to mention, I, I said it was a big thing is the outdoor advertising signs. The Village of Buchanan, gosh, many years ago, and it was spearheaded by Gary Bell, we had some of the outdoor advertising signs and there was legislation passed in the Village of Buchanan to not only take down the outdoor advertising signs, so, some of the people that have been with us here for a while know where those signs were. And there was legislation passed at that time that there would be no future outdoor advertising signs. So, we, we fit into that criteria.

The AEDs, we do have them here in the village hall and, and what that's -- there's a way, it has directions on it. I took this class like five years ago, but we do have donated by Cortlandt Ambulance outside the senior and our community room. If we're ever, if we ever need that there are directions on how to use that. So, we do have that available in the building.

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That's why I mentioned the temporary ones. Do you think what during the winter. do you think it'll be a problem if it snows the snow plowing and stuff?

MR. CAPICOTTI: No. I actually, I installed speed bumps in Mount Vernon and Yonkers permanent, all over the place. It's part of our contract of, of our highway improvement. So, no, it's not a problem. It's actually, the temporary ones are a problem, you know, because they're temporary and they and they're actually, you have to actually almost come to a complete stop to go over those. You know, it's not it's, it's, it's not the way, you know, there are DOT drawings on speed bumps that are, you know, it's, it's a speed bump. It's not a stop bump. So, you want the car to be able to go over it at a, no more than a 20 mph speed. And that's what, so it's a it's, it's just an increase in, in elevation of three inches, believe it or not.

Because we do, we do get complaints and I know, I know the chief has had that up there, the, the bump -- the, the radar thing, but, I don't know. We get complaints, Tate Avenue all over, we, we hear of speeding. So, I don't know. We'll, we'll see. We'll figure it out. All right. Dan is next.

MR. STEWART: Yeah, just a couple things. I know we discussed in the workshop about a revised master plan. I think the last one was done in 2005. I'd really like to move forward and try and form a committee, so that we have outside opinion and try and move that along forward. I don't know if we heard anything from David. I know you were going to get some soft costs.

MR. SERRANO: Yeah. Based on your thing, David, if the board is willing to, he can attend the next workshop and talk about options and how

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the village will proceed. So, I won't be, I won't be here at that meeting, but Dave say he's available. So, if the mayor wants to put him on the agenda we could.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah, bring him in. Cindy, just put that down, yeah.

MR. STEWART: I think we should, I think that's something we should move on.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: This way we can all ask what we need to ask.

MR. SERRANO: Perfect.

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a quick alert. The spotted lantern fly threatens

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our trees. Trees of heaven, the ones that seem to

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grow overnight along roadsides, are highly

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invasive and often thought of as weeds. Lantern

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flies prefer feeding on them. Residents can help

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or rubbing alcohol and by removing any of these

by scraping egg masses into bags of soapy water

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trees from their yards. Acting now protects our

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neighborhood and shared spaces, like Parcel B.

Speaking of which, thank you for the

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opportunity to speak about the strip of land

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between 253 and 255 Westchester Avenue, I

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prepared a packet for your review providing a

23

concise overview of the land's history, current

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use, and potential solutions.

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Parcel B has been used exclusively by my family for 55 years as a driveway. During that time, we've maintained it continuously, keeping it safe, functional, and free of hazards. Since Village Hall moved here in 1976, Parcel B has never been used or maintained by the village. My family has taken full responsibility for its upkeep. Without parcel B, my mother, who has lived here for decades, would have no practical way to use a vehicle safely. Its narrow width, slope, and lower blind spot make public traffic unsafe. So, its primary value is as the driveway for 255 Westchester Avenue.

Several options have been considered, including informal use, partial access, easement, lease, or nominal sale. The most practical low risk solution is a nominal sale or alternatively a formal, excuse me, easement. This acknowledges decades of responsible use, secures permanent legal access and eliminates potential liability for the village.

Local comparable vacant lots show Parcel B has modest financial value. Considering decades

2	of attentive care, the cost of maintaining safe
3	access is minimal. National examples show
4	municipalities often formalize small parcels

9	precedent make a nominal sale the simplest,
10	fairest, and most practical solution.
