MS. THERESA KNICKERBOCKER: Welcome to
The Village of Buchanan September 9 special board
meeting. Please join me in the pledge of
allegiance.

MULTIPLE: I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay, thank you. On Zoom is Trustee Laker, and the Administrator,
Marcus Serrano, is on vacation until the 24th.

In case of emergency, please use the exit door to my left, to your right. And, also, do not use the elevator, use the staircase behind the elevator.

Under new business -- first, I want to explain why we're having this special meeting.

We are going to approve a grant application for some streets in the Village here. There's a \$15 million grant that Westchester County has put forward, and we'd like to put some streets in

2	there, and also possibly receive some money. I
3	believe it's a 50 percent grant, so whatever we
4	can get, you know, we'll go after those grants
5	and get some more infrastructure done.
6	So, first on the agenda is consider to
7	approve the hiring of Jim Thatcher. Is Jim on?
8	MR. DANIEL STEWART: He was on, yeah.
9	He was up on the top.
10	MR. JIM THATCHER: I'm here, Mayor. Can
11	you hear me?

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relatively brief. We started talking to Marcus a year ago, more than a year ago, about your pool, both the wading pool and the main pool and some mechanical, filtration, piping. I think the aluminum wading pool is also problematic with the Department of Health. Just a myriad of issues with your pool in terms of its upkeep and keeping it viable for the long term.

So, New York SWIMS is a program that the governor initiated a year ago with at least a couple of rounds of funding through the State Office of Parks and Recreation, but the grant is administered through the Dormitory Authority. Last year, you guys looked like a good candidate, but there was a scoring metric that was pass/fail in order for your application to be even read or considered. And it was based on some census numbers and a need for swimming facilities in the county of which you're in, Westchester County. And that metric calculated to the point where you guys would not, we don't think you guys would have been considered. You wouldn't, you wouldn't have gotten a fair consideration. So, we pulled

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back and didn't do that grant application.

Fast forward to now, and round 2 has about \$53 million in it statewide. They changed that metric, that initial pass/fail criteria, tweaked it a little bit. So, there's still an emphasis on what they call underserved communities, communities that don't have access to swimming or, or have maybe a greater swimming need, if you will. But they changed the pass/fail to the point where you guys are eligible and you would, at least, be considered. And I think you, I think you still have a decent shot. You're not defined as underserved in terms of your swimming need, but you are a disadvantaged community per the DEC, and you have some other things going for you, well, good and I mean, obviously, with, with what's bad. happened with environmental justice and being a disadvantaged community with Indian Point and all that. But you have some things that make going for certain grants in your favor.

So, long story short is that, for your pool and for the issues that you're dealing with,

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this is a capital grant program, design, engineering, bidding, and construction to redo as much of the pool complex as you need to or, or would like to, to make it viable and affordable. You are eligible. And a project in the range of, you know, \$300,000.00 or higher would be eligible for 80% grant funding.

And a lot of the, the first round winners were big cities, you know, Albany, Schenectady, up north. There wasn't much in Westchester County, but out west, Buffalo, Syracuse, some of the, the main largest municipalities that had multi-million-dollar pool reconstruction projects, those have been funded. So, hopefully, they've kind of moved some of the bigger communities out of the way and can kind of dip down lower into the scale so that you guys have a, have a good shot.

I think that's a pretty good synopsis, but it's, you know, on paper, it's really good for your pool and your needs. I, I'm sure it's going to be fairly competitive because pools just haven't been a focus of the state for a long

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time. But you will, you will get considered and you will get a fair reading, we hope. So, we resubmitted basically the same proposal from last year that, that Marcus was agreeable to, and we'll kind of run, run with it if you agree to go for it.

October 30th is the deadline, and I think Marcus has already supplied us with some of the engineering and assessment reports and some, some details about your pool problems that we can work from. So, I'll, I'll stop there, unless there's questions.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: So, this would be for the kiddie pool and for the main pool, the grant application?

MR. THATCHER: Yeah, I think that it should be for both. I think you should try in one swoop to do as much as you need to do for the, for the entire complex. The grant program would also fund sort of, you know, ancillary facilities, like bath houses or fencing. You know, things that sort of are capital related, but around the pool or needed for the pool to

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make a complete complex.

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can do some other things like restrooms, bath houses, picnic pavilion or, you know, something that goes with your pool that may need some work, as well. So, you could kind of think of it more holistically, at least, for as much as you, as much as you can stand to do for that, your pool complex.

KNICKERBOCKER: All in favor? 12 13 MULTIPLE: Aye. 14 MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Okay. So, we've 15 been discussing this for a while, the Complete 16 Streets. Like I just said before, the county has a \$15 million program. We have been dis-, the 17 18 Board members have been discussing what streets 19 they would like to put the grant in for. One of 20 the grants is across the street from Da Ros on 21 Albany Post Road. Another one is Bannon Avenue

and the Kings Ferry intersection, and also Tate

Avenue and the Kings Ferry intersection. And the

other one is on Westchester Avenue. If that gets

That is the only section on 4 Westchester Avenue that does not have a sidewalk, and it's in the school area. 5 6 So, those were the three that the, the 7 Board came up with. Any comments from the Board members? Okay, okay. Anyone who comes to speak, 8 9 please give your name and --10 MR. RICHARD FUNCHION: Richard Funchion, 11 179 Kings Ferry Road. I got the notice in my 12 mailbox, but I don't fully understand what are 13 they going to do. And maybe, correct me if I'm 14 wrong, but somebody in Montrose complained about 15 the intersections of Kings Ferry and Bannon and 16 Kings Ferry and Tate. What, what are we, what, 17 what's the Village doing? 18 MS. KNICKERBOCKER: So, what we're doing 19 is the handicap accessible, it dips down and, you 20 know, it has the little grates on it before it 21 goes into the road. 22 MR. FUNCHION: Because it is already, 23 the, the sidewalk already dips down.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: No, no. You have to

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MR. STEWART: It has to be compliant.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah, it's, yeah.

As Dan said, not ADA-compliant.

MR. FUNCHION: Oh, okay. Alright.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah. That's

basically. We're not --

MR. STEWART: That's the main reason, Rich.

MR. FUNCHION: Okay.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: We're not looking -- and then, striping. And, and also striping it.

MR. FUNCHION: Right. And being that you're talking about a handicapped person, that intersection, since I've been up here since 1977, has got -- is a disaster. You, you now have dozens of kids up and down. You can't, you get -- you do not get a sightline when you're coming from further up on, on Kings Ferry Road. And they're coming over the hill, people are coming out from Tate, and it's just a matter of time until there's a real accident. So, I wish that, that the parents would stop letting their kids go

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out on a busy street, doing wheelies. And it's, it's, it's really, I feel sorry for the, for the kids, because one of them is going to wind up being paralyzed or something. And, and they come around the corner from Kings Ferry to go onto Tate, and the turns are real wide.

And this is not to mention about, also what's, it's a thing of life, quality of life, is the amount of cars now and trucks without mufflers has gotten out of hand. They're, I mean, I find, I find like I'm living in a, in a, I don't know, a city street down in New York City, because it's so loud and, and people speed. And the problem is you've got one jurisdiction on one side of the street and another jurisdiction on the other side of the street. So, I don't know, do not know what the solution is, but it's just a matter of time before some people get hurt. And, and that's a very bad place.

I know there was one individual on Kings

Ferry Road up into the Montrose section that

tried for years with the Town of Cortlandt to get

speed bumps put in, because it's, it's out of

2	control. But, so you're saying that this, this
3	thing that's, you're going to put in grating?
4	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: And then, also the
5	walkway line.
6	MR. STEWART: The ADA compliant
7	MR. FUNCHION: Oh, yeah, the striped
8	lines, you mean?
9	MR. STEWART: Yeah.
10	MR. FUNCHION: Is that the ones that you
11	have to, the car has to stop for?
12	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: No, it's just a
13	crosswalk.
14	MR. FUNCHION: Oh.
15	MR. ANTHONY CAPICOTTI: The reason why
16	we're doing this, actually, is to protect the
17	pedestrians walking across the intersections.
18	The pedestrian crosswalk will be set back. The,
19	the ped ramps now, the pedestrian ramps that are
20	in place right now, actually cast you out into
21	the, into traffic. So, they will be redesigned
22	to, with ADA-compliant tiles to proceed you into
23	the crosswalk, to send you into the crosswalk to
24	the other side, which will line up. They're

2	actually going to be recessed, the crosswalks
3	will be recessed with a stop bar being five feet
4	back. George has a design that he draw, drew up
5	for both intersections, and we can make that
6	accessible to you, somehow, on the website, if,
7	if that's possible.
8	MR. FUNCHION: The other thing was, that
9	I just noticed coming up here, they took the sign
10	away for Buchanan.
11	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Well, that, somebody
12	had complained about the sign not
13	MR. STEWART: The condition, right.
14	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: the condition of
15	it, so we're going to reinstall
16	MR. FUNCHION: Oh, okay. Alright.
17	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: another sign,
18	yes.
19	MR. FUNCHION: Alright, thank you very
20	much.
21	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah, Rich, you're
22	at a, you're at a, a pretty dangerous
23	intersection there. And I know I was coming out
24	of Tate Avenue, taking a left to go to Montrose.

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2	And it's, you've got to move fast because they
3	come up over the hill pretty fast there.
4	MR. FUNCHION: And they're speeding.
5	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah, probably. I,
6	you know, I, I'm sure they are.
7	MR. FUNCHION: I think there were
8	several incidences where there was crashes and
9	the people coming over the hill are screaming and
10	yelling at people coming out of Tate. And the
11	officers have said, if you weren't speeding,
12	you'd be able to stop.
13	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: So, is there, for
14	years I, I just don't remember. I don't
15	travel there that often. Is there there used
16	to be a caution light there. Is there anything
17	there anymore?
18	MR. FUNCHION: It's a flashing light
19	there.
20	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: It's a flashing
21	light?
22	MR. FUNCHION: Yeah. But, I mean, you
23	can't put a if you put in a regular light, I
24	could never get out of my driveway. You know,

2	it's, it's a
3	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah. Like you
4	said, I don't know what the answer is there.
5	MR. FUNCHION: It's just people having
6	some consideration for the people in the, in the
7	neighborhood. You know, I see this white pickup
8	truck going back and forth [unintelligible]
9	[00:14:56]. It hasn't got a, a muffler on it.
10	And, you know, it disturbs the whole
11	neighborhood. And motorbikes. There are some
12	people on motorbikes, the thing is real quiet.
13	Others have to rev the thing up. And it's, it's
14	just, it's not fair to the people who live here,
15	you know. Thank you.
16	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Alright. Thanks for
17	your comments, Rich.
18	MR. STEWART: Thank you, Rich.
19	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Anyone else? Okay.
20	MR. JOHN PAUL: Paola and John Paul from
21	3109 Albany Post Road. I believe that's what
22	you're calling across from Da Ros?
23	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yes.
24	MS. PAOLA PAUL: It's not across from Da

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Ros.

MR. PAUL: Well, you know.

MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Well,

easier for me to explain to people.

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MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Well, it's just easier for me to explain to people where the proximity of the area.

MR. PAUL: Well, I've been looking into this, and I don't think you guys were given all of the information on this program, so I just have some facts and some just, you know, matter of fact things that we feel about this. I think there's a few important things to mention about the Complete Streets funding.

The funding roadway design features include sidewalks, lane striping, bicycle lanes, paved shoulders suitable for use of bicyclists, signage, crosswalks, pedestrian controlled signals, bus pull-offs, curb cuts, raised crosswalks, ramps, and traffic calming measures. So, you can do all of these things, not just sidewalks.

The New York DOT already reviewed the shoulder area in front of our property and found that there's no reason to install a sidewalk as

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far as safety and walkability is concerned. Just as important as to what I just mentioned, the Complete Streets funding for New York State encompasses county and state roads. However, it's important to note that the Westchester County program only applies to municipal roads, not state or county roads, just like Albany Post Road.

Now, 3109 Albany Post Road is built in 1910. In 115 years, this property has never had a sidewalk and has never had a pedestrian casualty in front of it, as far as we know. whilst the Village of Buchanan wishes to install a sidewalk in front of our property, we don't believe that the County or Westchester DOT, West-, New York DOT, would want to destroy private property on a stretch of land that has already been deemed safe for pedestrians. So, we feel that submitting this site for you to get the approval for doing work on our property is not going to make it safer for school children, as Buchanan narrative states, because it's already safe. If the Village would like to discuss

4	MS. PAUL: In front of the wall.

16	it safe, and we see bicycles go by there all
17	hours. We see
18	MS. PAUL: Children on bikes.
19	MR. PAUL: the, the problem is the
20	entrance to where the Carbone's property. That's
21	where we see almost accidents every single day.
22	MS. PAUL: Every single day. And there
23	have been multiple, multiple accidents all the
24	time on that property.

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MR. PAUL: The only other fear I have about installing a sidewalk in front of our property, and this is a valid concern, how many times we have been almost rear-ended, rear-ended coming into our property. And there have been several times where a child, teenager, younger, will be walking in front of our driveway, no problem. I slow down, I wait for them to pass. I have had people swerve around me into oncoming lanes to go around me, because they don't know what I'm doing. I'm obviously waiting to pull into my driveway. So, my fear is that installing a major drive-, a major sidewalk in front of our property might create more problems for us and might not help with the safety of the children, as you speak.

Now, like I said, DOT already deemed this area safe. I know that, for the town, you guys would love to see sidewalks going all the, you know, all the way across. That's great. But can we figure out a way not to destroy our property?

I know it's on a different matter, but

there's already three code violations going on from the Carbone's property that I have discussed with you guys, you know, in the past, that affect our living in there now. It's created that marshland in the back, which was never there before, 25 years ago. Now, we've already been dealing with not having the full use of our property. And to think about you taking more? It's really disturbing. So --

MS. PAUL: Which, you would have to move our wall. And I'm not donating any property either.

MR. PAUL: So, if there --

MS. PAUL: Because there had been mention by Marcus that I had to donate property. That's a no. I'm not donating any property.

MR. PAUL: So, our worry is that, if you were going to put, like, an eight-foot sidewalk or something with grass with the sidewalk, you're going to destroy our wall, you're going to destroy our side retaining wall. You're most likely going to remove our tree, and possibly even take out one parking spot, which we have a

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2	small enough driveway as it is. So, please
3	understand where we're coming from.
4	Now, to be honest with everybody,

7	conversation with us about it.

MS. PAUL: It was hit by a car, by a drunk driver. So, we need that. We need our, our wall there to protect our house from being hit by cars.

MR. PAUL: So, even if today is just going to show you the importance of what we feel, not having it there, or, or at least you know that nobody has -- I mean, I sent an e-mail to the two of you a while back. I didn't get a response. I kind of assumed I wouldn't, but -- not that it's not a here or there, but at least you know now, definitely. We, besides the initial talking about it when the Carbone project started, and you guys were just talking about it, we weren't even here. I just watched the videos and heard discussion. Like I said, we've had traffic studies, we spent money on traffic studies to see what the impacts were on Broadway, and there's just different requirements from them that I don't think is in the Village's best interest.

So, I would like to ask anyone if they think that we should continue or go forward with this.

MS. BAEZ: No, I don't. We've been going back and forth for over a year. I do find that the CBA is one-sided and there is no benefit

to the Village. I agree 100 percent with what you said. And, at this point, we -- I've said it in e-mails and I've said it to the Board, we are at, at an impasse. They want what they want, we want what the residents need. So, to me, to continue would be fruitless, so my answer is no.

MR. STEWART: I would agree with Awilda and the Mayor on that. I, I don't feel the need to move forward on this, not to put the Village in a detrimental situation.

MS. BAEZ: Uh-uh.

MR. LAKER: I --

MR. CAPICOTTI: I -- go ahead, Steven.

MR. LAKER: Yeah, just, just real quick.
But I, I think I'm the complete opposite of, of
the three sent-, you know, statements stated
before. I think that CertainTeed is, is now our
biggest employer. It, it is a part of the

us thought there was a way that we could work out
some type of an agreement, we would. Remember,
we did the traffic studies, the original impacts
came in at a very much higher price. Then, it
was lessened and discounted and down to
\$42,000.00. It, it's just some of the items that
they're asking for, I, I firmly believe that they
will not budge on. And the items that they won't

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budge on, I think are not in the Village's best interest.

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MS. BAEZ: I agree.

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MS. KNICKERBOCKER: I mean, we'd all like to get -- this, the original plan was to get money to compensate the Village for the impacts of, of their big trucks on Broadway and the damage that the big trucks do on Broadway. So, the original agreement, and, and Dan alluded to it, was that they would, they understood that there was an impact, and then we, we were just, you know, we were just getting ready to do the zoning and everything, and we understood where they were. And we thought we were pretty much close to an agreement at that time, until they come along with their community benefit. And it, it took a long time, because I kept asking our attorney, so, have they sent the community benefit? Have they sent it? No, no, no, no, no.

So, I, I'm sorry that this fell apart. I, I was, we were all hopeful that the Village would receive some money for the impact, but it, it definitely fell, fell apart. And I just see

I feel like there's, there's been 16 talks and, yes, I'm done negotiating with them. I feel the same as everybody else. The 17 18 negotiations were done. They, they have been 19 completed, we came to an agreement. 20 agreement should have been written by us and we 21 should have submitted it. We gave them the 22 opportunity. 23 Now, of course, they're going to protect 24 themselves and put all kinds of stuff in there

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that protects them in the future, and that's what they're looking for, protection, because they're, they're, they're afraid of what could happen to them if, if, in the future, if the Board changes or anything like that. I get it. I understand they want to be protected. But we have to protect our Village.

MS. BAEZ: Absolutely.

MR. CAPICOTTI: Okay. That's why we should have, out of the best interests of our residents, submitted them what we think the agreement should have been, not what they think the agreement should be. And I still stand with that.

MS. BAEZ: But they still, they would have come back with their rebuttals.

MR. CAPICOTTI: And they can come back with whatever we (sic) want, and then we could have said, okay, now this is what we want. You can put in what you think is necessary, but this is where we draw the line. We came, we allowed them to protect themselves at every corner that they can by writing their own agreement. I don't

know who does that. I mean, we, we really, we really should have submitted it ourselves. And I still feel that we can. And if, if we're not going to do it, then I don't think we're doing our due diligence to, to fulfill this negotiation.

MS. STEPHANIE PORTEUS: Can I just say something?

MS. BAEZ: Absolutely.

MS. PORTEUS: I think our agreement would have been what we all thought we agreed to, which Anthony Mirand (phonetic) and I had numerous discussions on, which was \$42,000.00 a year, right, for road improvements. We had been talking with Dave about rezoning and maybe an overlay, or what we were going to do. We're leaving them out of that. We're not touching it, right? We're going to move on to the rest of, you know, Holtec and on. So, that's what the agreement would have looked like. And if you think that they would have said okay, we would have seen this and this and this right attached to it.

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2	MR. CAPICOTTI: I agree. No, no, no
3	doubt about it.
4	MS. PORTEUS: Right.
5	MR. CAPICOTTI: But
6	MS. PORTEUS: They know what the
7	agreement was.
8	MR. CAPICOTTI: But then, they would
9	know where we're coming from. This is as simple
10	as it gets. This is our agreement. This is as
11	simple as it gets. This is all we want. You
12	can't we can't guarantee you protection from
13	anything.
14	MS. PORTEUS: Right.
15	MR. CAPICOTTI: We can't do that. It's
16	impossible. You know, there's too many, too many
17	citizens involved, commu- community members that
18	have put input in,
19	MS. PORTEUS: Thank you.
20	MR. CAPICOTTI: in the LWRP
21	MS. PORTEUS: Exactly.
22	MR. CAPICOTTI: that have, have had
23	input in this. But, ultimately, the LWRP is a
24	state. It, it, it's

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2	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: It's a state run.
3	MR. CAPICOTTI: It's with the state,
4	correct.
5	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: It's with the
6	Department of State, yeah.
7	MR. CAPICOTTI: So, even, whatever we
8	say, I mean am I wrong to say that the State can
9	come in and say whatever they want after the fact
10	anyway?
11	MS. PORTEUS: They're going to give
12	comments.
13	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: They're going to
14	give comments, recommendations.
15	MS. PORTEUS: Recommendations.
16	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: I spoke to them
17	today. I spoke, called up the Department of
18	State. They are not finished yet with their
19	comments. They're looking probably in the next
20	month to send that back to the community. Then,
21	after that, there's a 60-day pub-, there's a 60-
22	day comment period. I, I, myself, when I got the
23	document, the, the community benefit, was quite
24	surprised. And there is just a major disconnect

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2	and I, I don't see it being reconnected because
3	I'm understanding Stephanie, correct me if I'm
4	wrong there are, there are items in there,
5	there's no discussion, that's what they want.
6	And that's it.
7	MS. BAEZ: They're non-negotiables.
8	MR. LAKER: It's non-negotiable.
9	MS. BAEZ: They have non-negotiables in
10	it.
11	MR. LAKER: Now, the ones we got today,
12	we obviously haven't talked to
13	MR. CAPICOTTI: Did you redline it and
14	send it back to them?
15	MR. LAKER: I would redline everything
16	and send it back to them.
17	MR. CAPICOTTI: Did you send it back to
18	them?
19	MR. LAKER: And, and tell them that's
20	either acceptable or not acceptable.
21	MS. PORTEUS: It's not really redlined.
22	It's for you guys.
23	MR. LAKER: But the negotiation part of
24	it is done.

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2	MS. PORTEUS: It was stuff I provided to
3	
4	[CROSSTALK]
5	MR. CAPICOTTI: But what I'm saying is,
6	so, so you redline their contract and send it
7	back them before we say, oh, this is over.
8	MS. PORTEUS: Okay. But I'll redline
9	everything in it.
10	MR. CAPICOTTI: Then, redline whatever
11	you want.
12	MS. PORTEUS: Everything.
13	MR. CAPICOTTI: And that's exactly what
14	I want you to do. That's doing our due
15	diligence.
16	MS. PORTEUS: The new one? The new one?
17	MR. CAPICOTTI: Yeah. Every, all of
18	them.
19	MS. PORTEUS: Because we talked to
20	Anthony, and I have had this fight for the last
21	month.
22	[CROSSTALK]
23	MR. CAPICOTTI: I don't care. I want
24	Anthony, Paul, all of them to see it.

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2	MS. PORTEUS: That we've redlined it.
3	MR. CAPICOTTI: And then I feel like our
4	due diligence is done.
5	MS. PORTEUS: I'm happy to redline it.
6	MR. CAPICOTTI: Absolutely. Thank you.
7	MS. PORTEUS: A hun-, 100 percent.
8	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: It's all going to be
9	redlined.
10	MS. BAEZ: And for, for the record, you
11	have had this discussion anyway with their
12	lawyer. No, no, I know what you're saying, I
13	know what you're saying.
14	MS. PORTEUS: He would like a, he wants
15	infighting. He wants
16	MR. CAPICOTTI: I don't care about their
17	lawyer. He works for his client.
18	MS. BAEZ: I know. But they hired him.
19	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: So, Stephanie, send
20	back what the, our original agreement was and
21	MS. PORTEUS: And then redline all of
22	this.
23	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: Yeah, yeah. I
24	wouldn't even redline it. Send our agreement.

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2	What we would be wiling to sign. And if it's
3	not, then it's not.
4	MS. PORTEUS: So, which one is it?
5	Redline all of this? I could redline.
6	MR. CAPICOTTI: We aren't saying what
7	you should do, but if you, if you
8	MS. PORTEUS: And say
9	MR. CAPICOTTI: work for us,
10	MS. PORTEUS: Yeah.
11	MR. CAPICOTTI: I say you write your
12	own agreement and we send it, and that's it.
13	MS. KNICKERBOCKER: And just say that's
14	it.
15	MS. BAEZ: A paragraph.

18	MR. CAPICOTTI: I don't care if it's two
19	sentences or 10 sentences.
20	MS. BAEZ: It could be three sentences.
21	MS. PORTEUS: It would be an agreement
22	to, you know, take them off the rezoning, you
23	know, agenda. Which is what we agreed to, I
24	thought, and then this came through. But I've

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2	had a lot of discussions with him saying, how did
3	this turn into this? Well, you know, we're a
4	corporation. The corporate. We've got to
5	MR. CAPICOTTI: Because they're looking
6	for protection. They're going to want to invest
7	a ton of money in that facility, and that's what
8	they're looking for, protection. And that's
9	exactly what's going on.
10	MS. PORTEUS: Part of the
11	MR. CAPICOTTI: We can't offer them a
12	guarantee.
